

CANANDAIGUA GARDEN PARTY ON TOMORROW

Bouenber, Big Estate, To Be Opened to Public; 2,000 Visitors Are Expected

Canandaigua, June 18.—Last night's arrival of the big garden party to be held on the grounds of the late Mrs. Frederick Ferris Thompson, here Friday afternoon, sponsored by the Women's Society of the First Congregational Church, of which Mrs. Lewis W. VanDusen is president and Miss Geneva chairman of the fest.

A program replete with varied forms of entertainment, besides the opportunity for visiting the spacious grounds of the estate with its velvet lawns and unique gardens, is expected to attract hundreds of visitors from this city, Rochester, Geneva and neighboring communities, between the hours of 1 o'clock and 3:30. In case of a heavy rain the event will be held on Saturday, it is announced.

Sonsbeurg is now the property of Emory W. Clark of Detroit, nephew of Mrs. Thompson, through whose courtesy the fest is made possible. Some years ago, during the lifetime of Mrs. Thompson, it was an annual custom to throw the grounds open to the public for inspection several times each summer, and visitors from all over the country were attracted to the estate. Approximately 2,000 visitors were guests at the two preceding garden parties, including many in Rochester's social register. Children of members of the Inglewood Chapter, D. A. R., will be among the visitors this year, inspecting the extensive Ontario County Historical Museum here in the morning.

The present rumor, "If my friends think I am qualified I sincerely appreciate their confidence," he said. Mr. Wilson's friends point out that he has the desirable qualifications of being an honest-to-goodness "dirt farmer," as well as a recognized leader in the agricultural community, a scientist and a student. Mr. Wilson is a son of the late Dr. Thomas W. Wilson, for many years chairman of the agricultural committee of the State Senate. Charles S. Wilson is himself a former commissioner of agriculture of New York State, and previous to his appointment to that office was a professor of pomology at the New York State College of Agriculture, Cornell University.

Lightning Destroys Barn in Downpour of Hail, Rain

Temperature Drops, Bringing Relief From Torrid Wave; Hail May Have Undone Good Rain Did to Farm Crops

Medina, June 18.—During the severe electrical storm which started Monday afternoon lightning struck the large barn owned by Mrs. Eva Balch in the Bates Road, totally destroying the barn and contents. A bean thrasher owned by Charles Canham, which was on the premises, was also destroyed, with a loss to Mr. Canham of \$1,500. He carried no insurance. The loss to Mrs. Balch is \$2,000, partly covered by insurance. The Medina Fire Department responded and assisted in seeing nearby buildings.

The storm was accompanied by a heavy rain which came as a relief from the extreme hot weather which has prevailed the last two days. It being slightly cooler since the storm. Because of the sudden downpour many were startled and feared it would be a repetition of the flood of June 18 of last year. This section was badly in need of rain and crops have been benefited by this afternoon's storm.

Middletown, June 18.—The drought around Middletown was broken shortly after noon when a down-pour flooded the streets and taxed the sewers. Fallen leaves and twigs clogged the gutters and water from the street ran down the gutters. The water was about two inches over the curb at State Street and Maple Avenue 20 minutes after the rain started.

CARS HIT, ONE JUMPS DITCH, TWO NOT HURT

Drivers of Each Swear Out Warrants for Arrest of Other; Hearings Later

Waterloo, June 18.—E. Collins, 28, of 41 Chippewa Street, Buffalo, and his companion, Thomas Gilson, 27, also of Buffalo, miraculously escaped unhurt when the car he was driving struck another machine, driven by Thomas Corryell of Romulus, a glancing blow, left in the highway, jumping a deep ditch, narrowly missing a building and crashing into the front porch of the home of Mr. and Mrs. Frank White in Romulus.

Collins was arrested by Sheriff R. C. Traphagen on a warrant sworn out by Corryell, charging reckless driving, and was released by Justice of the Peace William Barnard of Romulus on his own recognizance until his arraignment on July 1. In turn, Collins swore out a warrant for Corryell's arrest on the same charge. Corryell is held in \$10 bonds pending his arraignment some time in July.

Geneseo, June 18.—Plans for the sesqui-centennial are progressing satisfactorily in the opinion of Dr. Alexander C.
