LISTEN VETERAN

DIVIDENDS: Payment of the special government insurance dividend starts on the first of this month and is expected to continue through August...

LEGISLATION: Hearings have been held by the House Committee on Veterans Affairs on G.I. insurance bills pending before it. A large number of these bills propose to reopen the National Service Life Insurance program for a period of one year...

Persons serving in the Armed Forces, their spouses, parents and in a few cases, children who accompany them, are eligible to apply for the Military Ballot and vote in the election.

Families having a member in service were urged by Mr. Tallman and Mr. Butler to visit their offices and obtain the military ballot applications they need. The veteran officials emphasized that the applications should be sent by the home front to members of the Armed Forces or their dependents who are eligible to vote...

QUESTIONS about the rights and benefits of veterans, servicemen or their dependents may be submitted for individual attention to the NYS Division of Veterans Affairs and Otsego County Veterans Service Agency at 4 Prospect Street, Oneonta, New York.

INSURANCE: A disability income provision may be added to most G.I. insurance policies for a small additional premium. This total disability income provision pays a monthly income to an insured who holds it while he is disabled and unable to work...

EDUCATION: Children of peace-time veterans, who have died of service-incurred disabilities since the end of the Korean conflict, are eligible for benefits under the Federal War Orphans Educational Assistance Act...

PENSION: Widows of servicemen or veterans in receipt of VA compensation or pension may immediately notify the VA if they remarry. The marriage of a child of any deceased serviceman or veteran for whom compensation or pension is being paid should also be reported immediately to the VA.

Veterans were reminded today that age is frequently the most important factor in securing non-service-connected pension. Mr. Raymond L. Tallman, Counselor of the New York State Division of Veterans Affairs, and Mr. G. Wayne Butler, Deputy Director of the Otsego County Veterans Service Agency, said that a veteran age 54 could, for example, be denied a pension which upon reapplication on reaching age 55 would be allowed.
