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Norwich Native Compiles Data **On Barnes Family**

NORWICH - Major Raymond C. Barnes, retired, of San Antonio, Texas, a native of Chenango County and Norwich has compiled the stories and lineage of the Barnes-King families: Jeremiah Barnes, who came from Holland and settled in Saybrook, Conn., in 1920 and John King of the Mayflower.

A copy of the manuscript is at the Guernsey Memorial Library under the title, "Barnes-King Related Families of Chenango County, New York."

"The Sanders family, that of Simeon Sanders born in Connecticut, these intermarried with the Kings and Roberts. The lineage of Richard Warren, a Mayflower "stranger" and of Stephen Hopkins, a Mayflower "saint," William Reed Sr., born 1639, married Hester Thompson and Mary Cook. Hence you have a most interesting group of families and well assembled material," Lucille Stewart Krisch recently wrote of the manuscript in a Texas newspaper under the caption, "Twigs, Trees."

"Major Barnes has documented these records from his own family records and of court records making a splendid contribution to American Genealogy," the Texas article continues. "The Barnes family will be surprised to find their North Carolina branches coming from New England originally. If these are your lines you will welcome the publication and may order from Major Barnes at his San Antonio, Texas, address, 130 Cyril Drive."

PREFACE

With the marriage of G. Curtis (Curt) Barnes and May A. Sanders, whose mother was Ellen B. King, two very old and early Chenango County, N.Y. families were united. Their histories are quite complete from present generations back to the early 1600's and by marriage of John King, 2nd, the maternal line is traced through the Mayflower Pilgrims, through Holland to Blythe, Nots., England, to the years 1577-1582.

This Barnes family are descendants of Jeremiah Barnes, who with his brother came from Holland and settled in Saybrook, Conn. in 1620.

This History of Barnes----King and Related Families gives all the presently known facts as compiled from authentic records. Previously published records are quoted where possible. Other information obtained from responsible researchers and from living descendants from their personal knowledge or records.

Many persons and families are mentioned though only remotely related to the subjects, yet by marriage or association enter into their lives and to give this record a broader meaning and authenticity. It is hoped that others will find some information herein of value in perusing their own history further and may be able to fill in their own genealogy from these pages.

This genealogy of the Barnes--King and Related Families of Chenango County, N.Y., will consist of not more than fifty copies of this first edition. Some will be distributed free to Genealogical and Historical Societies and Libraries, for public use, not for circulation, but as a reference and permanent record.

References hereto are permitted, when proper credit is given, but this record may not be published without the written permission of the author or his representative.

BARNES FAMILY NAME

The Barnes family name is said to have been derived from the ancient Norse "BYARNE", pronounced "Barn", meaning warrior, and was brought to England in 1066 A.D. with William the Conqueror, Barnes being a trusted aide. The name has been variously spelled; Barn, Berne, Barnes, Barns, etc. Records pertaining to my own ancestors are sometimes spelled Barns.

One of a Barnes family became the Lord Mayor of London. There was Barnaby Barnes, a poet, whose father was Bishop of Durham. William Barnes received land from Henry VIII, in the Royal Forest of Tillingham. Dame Juliana Barnes was a celebrated writer of the fourteenth century -- she was the daughter of a Baron. The family is a celebrated one, having more than it's share of famous and outstanding people.

Richard Barnes of Carsholto, England, had two sons: Richard and Abraham. Richard remained in England, but Abraham came to America about 1700 and settled in Maryland. One of his treasures was a portrait of his ancestor, Col. John Barnes of the British Army. He, Abraham, married Sarah McCarty, and they had one son, Abraham, Jr., born about 1701.

There are records of a Barnes family of Salsbury, N.C., descendants of Shadwick Barnes, Revolutionary soldier, and of his two brothers Aquill and Ellis. Ellis and Shadwick records are in Raleigh, N.C. Aquilla was killed in the battle of Cow Pens, S.C. His records are more complete in Charlestown or Columbus, S.C.

The records of the family are included with the Howe, Gordon, Ridgeway, Lloyds, Gallaspie, Herondons, De Jarnetts, etc. Descendants are scattered all over the country, particularly through North Carolina, Kentucky and Missouri

From San Antonio Light of October 9, 1960

In "History of Early Settlers of Sangamon County, Ill." will be found the names of Ezra Barnes, born Sept. 6, 1806, at Groton, Conn., New London County, who came to Sangamon County Nov. 18, 1833; married Elizabeth Mason, Dec. 6, 1838. They had five children all born in Sangamon County, Ill.; namely, Ezra, born April 30, 1842, married at Preston City, Conn. to Prudence A. Browning and resided five miles south of Chatham, Ill.; Seth A., born in Sangamon County, Ill., member of the firm of Barnes and Simpson, druggists, in Taylorville, Ill.; Olive F., married Feb. 10, 1876 to George Bremer; Charlie and Angeline lived with their parents in Ball Township two and one-half miles south of Chatham, Ill. Charley is the grandfather of Raymond Barnes, now in 1961 living in Chatham, Ill. The relationship between this Raymond Barnes and Raymond C. Barnes is not known.

One family of this name came from Otis, Mass. to Chenango County, N.Y. in the 1820's and settled in Pharsalia, then known as Pharsalia Hook. The writer is an ancestor of this family, the details of which follow so far as presently known down to and including some of the present generations.

The following quotations were extracted from the "Quill and Press," a weekly newspaper, published for a short time in North Pharsalia, New York, by Joseph C. White. Mrs. E. P. Smith, of Sherburne, N.Y., has some of these newspapers beginning with Volume 3, number one, dated January 28, 1881 and ending with Volume 4, number fifty-two, dated June 14, 1883. In June 1881, Horace L. Barnes began to write the personal and historical items from which much is learned about his father, Lyman Barnes, and other relatives.

March 8, 1883:

"In May 1827, Lyman Barnes came from Otis, Mass. and settled on lot 54 where he resided until about two years since. He was the son of William Barnes; a descendant of Jeremiah Barnes who, with his brother Robert, came from Holland in 1620 and settled at Saybrook, Conn. In 1760 the state of Massachusetts offered to give land to actual settlers, and Phineas Barnes, Lyman's grandfather, with his brothers William, Benjamin and Jeremiah came from Middleton, Conn. and settled in Granville, where many of their descendants now reside."

1850 Census. Town of Pharsalia, N.Y. Family No. 112. Lyman Barnes, aged 55 born in Mass. Sibel Barnes, aged 48 born in Conn.

1875 Census. Pharsalia, N.Y. Family No. 2 Lyman Barnes, aged 81 born in Mass. Sibyl Barnes, aged 80 born in Conn.

Madison and Chenango Counties History by Smith, published in 1880, shows "Lyman, his wife, and son Horace came to Pharsalia in the early 1820s and Horace was born in Otis, Mass." D.A.R. records show Lyman born in 1795.

On May 7, 1827, Sibley Marsh of Pharsalia, bargained to sell to William T. White and Lyman Barnes, of Pharsalia, for \$230.00, a piece of land 86 rods square, containing 60 acres. Etc. Justis Grant, Witness.

Book NN, pg. 351 of Deeds 1st May 1829, William T. White, of Pharsalia, sold to Lyman Barnes onehalf of the sixty acres. Etc. Justus Grant, Witness.

Book 77, pg. 14 of Deeds 12th of March, 1847. Lyman and Sibel Barnes sold the balance of this 60 acres to James Beach, of Pharsalia, it being 28 acres and 88 perches. Signed: Lyman Barnes -- Sibyl Barnes.

April 8, 1881, from the "Quill and Press." "Lyman Barnes of this village is over 87 years of age and has an excellent memory." Jan. 19, 1882

"Mrs. Sybal Barnes, of this village, is very near death's door."

June 1, 1882

"Aunt Sybal Barnes is no better."

June 8, 1882

"Aunt Sybal Barnes, whom we mentioned last week as being no better, is not expected to live long. Today she is so low that she does not notice anyone."

June 29, 1882

"Aunt Sybal's health is slowly fading. It won't be long 'ere she leaves us."

July 13, 1882

"DIED: of cancer, at North Pharsalia, July 7, 1882, Sybal, wife of Lyman Barnes, in her 87th year. Deceased was a daughter of Isaiah and Wealthy White, and was born in Stonington, Conn., August 28, 1795. In 1814 she accompanied her father's family to Tolland, Mass., on May 29, 1816 she married. In May 1827 she, and her husband came to this town, where they have since resided. During her long sickness she was a great sufferer, and she bore it with patience waiting for her heavenly Father to call her spirit home. More than sixty years ago she made a profession of religion, and united with the Methodist Church, which during her long pilgrimage was the church of her choice. Only those most intimately associated with her knew with what meekness and humility she lived the religion she professed. We realize that our loss is her gain. Though dead she liveth again."

"The funeral of "Aunt Sybal," as she was termed by all, was the largest held in this village in many years. She died Friday (July 7th) and the funeral took place Sunday. As soon as possible, Rev. L. S.Robinson, of Syracuse, was telegraphed to and came the next day following. At 1 o'clock P.M. the funeral commenced; and the remains were interred at East Pharsalia. Mrs. Barnes was the wife of Lyman Barnes; the mother of Horace L. and Emory P. Barnes; the sister of Mrs. Mercy Luther, Mrs. Wealthy Beach, and Austin White; all of this village save Mr. White who resides near Binghampton. She was born in one of the eastern states nearly 87 years ago, married Mr. Barnes when about twenty-one and soon after came to this town where they have since resided. During her long stay with us here she has continually manifested a Christian spirit and her manner has been exemplary in every particular."

Whether or not Lyman Barnes was born in Otis, Mass. is questionable, however, the 1820 Census shows that he was there in that year, that he was between 16 and 45 years of age and that his wife was between 16 and 26 years of age. He is the only Barnes shown in Otis Township, Berkshire County, at that time. Unfortunately, the Census Records for 1810-1820 show but one name, the head of each family.

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In May of 1827 he, his wife, and oldest son Horace came to Pharsalia, bought land and lived on it until March of 1847 when he sold it, but remained the remainder of his life at Pharsalia.

As a matter of record and for the benefit of others interested in genealogy and information about people and activities in Pharsalia, N.Y. in the early 1800's, there is quoted below items from the "Quill and Press," a local newspaper published first Jan. 28, 1881 and apparently terminating with Vol. 4 June 14, 1883 No. 52. It is not believed that any of these items have been previously extracted for publication. The Editor was Joseph White, son of Isaiah White, a prominent storekeeper of North Pharsalia, New York.

September 23, 1881:

"Clara White, of Michigan, widow of Isaiah White, who died in this town many years ago, has returned to this village to pass the remainder of her years among her sons and daughters."

November 3, 1881 under locals:

"Altheria White is taking music lessons of Rose Merriams." "Isaiah White has drawed stones and made a cross walk opposite his grist mill." "Isaiah White is Collector in school Dist. People paying their tax within two weeks will avoid the five per cent."

May 6, 1881:

"What wonderful thing happened on the 4th of this month? Answer: The Editor was 20 years old." "Go to Isaiah White's and get a good straw hat for five cents. Now is the time to avail yourself of a grand opportunity." "WANTED - 10,000 men, women and children to buy the wonderful cheap goods on our 20 cent counter. I. White." "Pharsalia wallows in lemon pies and swims in lemonade, since I. White sells them for 2 cents each." (the lemons I suppose.)

June 17, 1881:

"Mrs. Polly Tyler who has been visiting at her son-in-law's, Isaiah White, in this village for the past six weeks, has returned to her home in Smithville." (Chenango Co.)

June 24, 1881:

"In nearly every newspaper we find something relating to rabid dogs, and at last our neighborhood is inflicted with the same. Last Monday night Dwight Law's dog showed signs of running mad, and it was killed. The dog was a very large one and if it had been allowed to run at large no doubt would done a great deal of damage."

"By invitation the following made Miss Alice Henery an afternoon visit on Saturday: William Paul and his sister Ella, Nettie Fink, Ella Smith and the editor and his sister Altheria." (proving that the editor was son of Isaiah White) Oct. 27, 1881: "Alice Henery, of Plymouth, is at Norwich boarding at Mrs. Thompson's and learning dressmaking of Mrs. Robinson." Nov. 17, 1881: "H. L. Barnes has sold over 2000 acres of land since last January." Dec. 8, 1881: "NOTICE; The friends and especially the relatives of Joseph C. White are invited to assemble at the residence of Isaiah White, in the village of North Pharsalia, Chenango Co. N.Y. Saturday evening Dec. 10, 1881 for the purpose of a reception. The evening will be enjoyed by harmless plays and a problem that will be solved in the evening. It is an extra occasion. Don't fail to make your appearance." Dec. 15, 1881: "Mr. and Mrs. Charles Grammo, of Norwich, visited friends in this village this week." "MARRIED- In Norwich, Dec. 5th, at the bride's parents, by Rev. H. L. Delano, Mr. Joseph C. White, of North Pharsalia, to Miss Ann E. Grammo of Norwich." March 9, 1882: "Isaiah White and wife, of this village, were married 24 years ago on March 7th." "Isaiah White has rented the house and 5 acres of land of Henry Marritt, in this village, for one year for \$30.00." May 11, 1882: "A 3 yr. old colt was stolen from the premises of Emory P. Barnes last Friday evening, for which a reward of \$25.00 is offered. The animal bears the following description; black or dark brown, good size for his age, has white feet and ankles and white strip in his face, forward fetlock sheared and the end of his tail cut off square; has been shod forward and had on one shoe. Said colt is supposed to be stolen. LATER; The colt was found in Rudolph Newton's lot." Horace L. Barnes, who wrote the local news items, came to the time when he must tell of the old old settler Isaiah White. Feb. 8, 1883: "In the fall of 1817 Isaiah White came from Tolland Mass., and purchased a part of lot 72, now owned by Jos. Slater, and settled on same; He was a son David White, and was born in Worcester, Mass., -- He had two brothers, George and Solomon, who settled in this state near Albany; two sisters, Hipsah, and Thighah, who married and settled in Stonington, Conn. When quite a young man, Isaiah White went to Stonington Conn., and there married Wealthy Cook. He resided in Stonington a few years and then moved to Unadilla in this state. After a few years he returned to Stonington, and from there he moved to Goshen about the year 1813, and from there to Tolland, Mass., and in 1817 he removed to this town where he resided till his death in 1853, aged 85 years. continued

He was not an educated man, but was well read, particularly in the Bible. He had a large family of children, a part of them settled in this town, and two of them, Mrs. Wealthy Chapman and Mrs. Mercy Luther now reside here. His youngest son, Prentice in the Florida Indian War, and was killed there about 1836. Ten of his grandsons and two great grandsons of Isaiah White were volunteers in the War for the Supression of the Rebellion, and no braver soldiers ever carried a musket. Several of them were in the 114 Regiment and were in all the battles of that regiment."

NOTE: The 114 Regiment of Infantry, a New York State volunteer regiment was made up almost entirely of Chenango Co. men, Headquarters at Norwich and on Sept 3, 1862, mustered in the service of the United States for three years. The Regiments skirmishes and campaigns is fully outlined in New York in the War of the Rebellion, 1861-1865; Third Edition, 1909; in five volumes and an Index volume; Phisterer. Published by the State of New York; J.B. Lyon Co. State Printers, 1912. Another reference work is to be highly commended is Frederick H. Dyer's COMPEN-DIUM on the War of the Rebellion, in three volumes (reissued 1959) by Thomas Yoseloff.

May 25, 1882:- "James Beach died May 19, 1882, aged 81 years. He was born in Canada in 1801. In 1827 he came to Pharsalia and soon married Wealthy White, daughter of Isaiah White. They moved to McDonough, then returned to Pharsalia in 1839. His daughter was Mrs. David White, and he had a grandson John Beach.

Dec. 27, 1881;- "The matrimonial noose has lately encircled the necks of two of our editorial brethern: G.H. Manning of the "Chenango Union", Norwich, and J.C. White, of the "Quill and Press". (from DeRuyter Gleaner)

lst. settler of Pharsalia was Isaiah White and his wife Wealthy Cook. They must have been married about 1788. He died 1853 aged 85 years, thus born 1768.

The older of the two sons of Lyman Barnes and Sibyl White was born in Otis Township, Berkshire County, Mass., about 1823 according to a note in the back of Chenango and Madison County Historys by Smith published in 1880.

In May of 1827 he came with his parents to N.Y. and settled in Pharsalia where he lived the remainder of his life. The 1870 Census shows him living with his father, mother; his wife Sarrah and three year old daughter. Assessors books of Pharsalia show that he was there in 1872-73-75 and 79. The 1875 Census was signed by him as Census Taker.

Smith's book, above, elaborates on the activities of Horace and gives a more thorough insight about him when he states "Horace L. Barnes, farmer real estate dealer, and land owner born in Otis, Mass., Sept 4, 1822, s May 5, 1827, P.O. West Pharsalia, owner of 1200 acres of land, held offices; Justice of the Peace, Town Supt. of Schools, Assessor, Census Enumerator, and Railroad Commissioner. Sarah Angel, his wife, born in Pharsalia, married Aug. 20, 1866. one child Mary Ann."

The Cemetery Records Book 2 of D.A.R. Page 54 show Pharsalia Township: Kirk Cemetery, Pharsalia, "Barnes, Lyman died May 15, 1885 ea. 90 Sybal, his wife, d. July 4, 1882 ea. 86.

Horace-- 1823-1901."

Note: Marcia F. Newton, apparently a member of the Cemetery Association in Norwich, N.Y. advises that the graves of the above are located in Fairview Cemetery, just back of the Free Methodist Church in North Pharsalia, N.Y. and quoted the monument inscriptions shown elsewhere.

Additional quotes from Smiths History.

"Hon. Horace L. Barnes was a Justice in 1880-81."

"1872, Horace L. Barnes was chairman of trustees and clerk, Free Methodist Church, No. Pharsalia."

"1872 He helped raise funds to build the Church, East Pharsalia."

"1873 Horace T Barnes, sold hotel.

"Early Civil War, Horace L. Barnes on committee to enlist volunteers."

Nothing was found in French's Gazetter or in Chenango County Biography of Personages.

Horace's wife, Sarah Angel, could be the daughter of Issac M. Angel and Rebecca, as Smith lists her as born in Pharsalia N.Y., The 1850 Census of Pharsalia shows Issac Angel aged 70 a farmer born in R.I., Rebecca Angel aged 60 born in Conn., John Angel aged 28, born in N.Y., and Henery Angel aged 15, born in N.Y. The only other Angel in the County in 1850 is Samuel Angel and his wife Mary aged 28, living in Plymouth and both born in N.Y. Sarah might well be the daughter of Issac and Rebecca and sister to John and Henry Angel.

"Died, in No. Pharsalia May 21st.1900 EMORY P. BARNES aged 67 years, he was the son of LYMAN AND SYBAL BARNES and brother of H.L. BARNES. A wife and four sons succeed him. He was possessed of strong mental and physical powers and of a genial and social disposition and of temperate habits. For the past forty years he has been deprived of the use of his lower limbs and for several years resided at his home in company with an Italian boy, FRANK KNAPP. Funeral services at the Free Methodist Church on the 23rd. inst., by G.W. VAN ANSDALE. Interment in Fairview Cemetery."

This 1850 Census of MARTHA WADE's family shows that her husband JOHN WADE is missing and assumed to be dead and she was left with three boys and two girls so MARTHA was counted as a part of the family when in reality she was either visiting or, as was customary, working for LYMAN BARNES when the Census was taken as she is also shown as MARIA BARNES aged eleven in the same Census under family 112. and that she later married EMORY BARNES. The records positively show that LYMAN BARNES had but two sons HORACE L. and EMORY P. Barnes. A living grand-daughter Mrs. CHARLES SAWYER states that MARIA had a brother MARTIN WADE and a sister, name not remembered, who married WILLMONT HALL., she further states her grand-mother name was Martha MARIA and that she went by that name.

G. Curtis (Curt) Emory Barnes, farmer and land owner tilled the soil for his parents until he was twenty-seven years of age. He then married May Adelia Sanders the daughter of a prosperous grocer in Norwich, N.Y. He and his bride settled on a farm near Lencklaen, Chenango County, N.Y., which is near So. Otselic. The couple were given a team of horses, harness, a few field implements, and some furniture as a wedding present, just the necessities to get started on their own.

He and his young wife worked hard and were thrifty and successful. In addition to housework she helped in the field until their first son was born. In a few years they moved to a farm at So. Plymouth, N.Y. Here their second son was born in 1899. This was the beginning of difficulties which may have been the eventual cause of his wife's death and nearly took his.

In the winter of 1898-99 Curtis scratched his right hand. Thinking that it was of no consequence, he continued to work. Infection developed, going into blood poisoning which extended to the shoulder and requiring many drainings. That he did recover was miraculous, but the recovery did leave him with a deformed hand, the thumb and first finger were the only ones he could use, but in spite of this handicap he continued to work his farm for eight more years.

With the birth of their second son, his wife never fully recovered, and in 1911 she died. During most of these years she was paralyzed from her waist down which eventually prevented her from doing anything. Even caring for her own personal needs required assistance, and moving about was accomplished with the use of a wheel chair.

Living on a farm miles from a doctor and school and having to drive over country roads in a wagon and horse was not convenient, so in 1907 the farm was sold and they moved to a home on Pleasant St. in Norwich, N.Y.

This move made medical attention easily available and grade and high school near for the boys; however, the problem of making a livelihood was not easy for a man having no knowledge of any trade other than farming. With his horses and wagon, Curtis did hauling, plowing gardens and worked on building and repairing town and county roads, wherever a man and horses were used, he was there to make money for medical expense, school and hired household help. To augment the income the boys delivered papers, ran errands and worked wherever possible after school and on Saturdays.

In 1910 the older son married and he and his wife went to Davenport, Iowa, matriculating in the Palmer School of Chiropractic which had a clinic, taking his mother with them as a last hope for her recovery. After about a year there, she and the younger son returned to Norwich and her home where she died a year later and was buried in Mt. Hope Cemetery beside her parents.

With the passing of his wife and oldest boy married and away, Curtis sold the home on Pleasant St. and lived for a while in various rented places. His younger son was a problem of proper care, so he left to make his way as best he could.

Now a man without obligations, he returned to the vicinity of his birth and bought a small farm near So. Otselic, married again and content working the soil. Ill fate still dogged him and after only two or three years, his second wife died of a stroke. At about this time his mother became a widow and went to live and keep house with her oldest son Curtis. After she passed on Curtis returned to Norwich where he lived alone in one half of a duplex on Piano St., near the Pharmacy, doing such work as he could, digging graves, and sexton of a cemetery. Here he lived when an oil stove exploded and burned him severely, and as a result he died a week later.

DR. CLAIR A. BARNES, was born on a farm at Lincklaen, Chenango County, N.Y., the first and oldest child of G. Curtis E. Barnes and his wife May A. Sanders. He was christened in the Methodist Church in So. Plymouth, N.Y., and later a member of the Broad St. Methodist Church in Norwich, N.Y., and in later years active in church

When about five years of age he moved, with his parents, to a farm at So. Plymouth N I, where he remained until his parents removed to Norwich, N.Y., in 1908 where he had the advantage of a high school education and from where he graduated.

During his last year at school he met, and after graduation, married Grace Mary Lewis at her home in Oxford, N.Y. She was the oldest daughter of George Lewis and Eva Root. Brothers and sisters were Lynn, Hazel, and Marguerite Lewis. Like her husband Clair, Grace was always active in church circles, Eastern Star and W.T.C.U. She was a talented organist and an excellent voice. She was church organist and with her husband sang at weddings and funerals and was a member of the church choir.

After graduation from the National Chiropractic College in Chicago, Ill., and passing the State Examining Board, he opened offices in his home in Galesburg, Ill. These facilities soon became inadequate, and he moved his offices into a downtown office building and later opened a private Sanitarium.

Things were not always rosy for Dr. Barnes. During his first years in Galesburg, Ill., he contracted dyptheria which caused many months of severe sickness and convalescing. During this time he had his invalid mother and younger brother with him, making additional expense and extra work for his wife. The depression of 1929-32 took it's toll of people in all occupations and callings. Salvaging what he could, he left Galesburg, Ill., and went to Chillachoe, Ill., where he began over. Here it was that his oldest living daughter Lois May died after a lifetime of sickness. Burial was in a local cemetery.

With the return of better times, Clair moved to a large home on W. Main St., in Peoria, Ill., Here he had offices on the first floor, and his large apartment on the second floor.

After graduating from Chiropractic, his son and fourth child, WAYLAND LEWIS BARNES, came to work with his father and carry on his father's practice and gradually taking it over.

CHAPTER

III

KING AND RELATED FAMILIES OF CHENANGO COUNTY N.Y.

The anscessors of these King families came from England in 1635, or earlier, and first settled at Weymouth, Mass. By marriage the blood lines go back to the Mayflower, through Holland to Blythe, Nots, England.

Research shows that there were two JOHN KINGS' in Weymouth at the same time and of about the same age. Which one was the father of SAMUEL KING is uncertain tho there is no question about his being the son of one of them. From him the remainder of this record is authenticated, and consists of about one hundred and fifty persons having that name plus another hundred of names of married daughters and their families.

THE KING'S SETTLEMENT CHURCH.

"In 1795 George E. King and his brother John King Jr. came to the wilderness of Chenango County, N.Y. There were no roads or communications, but plenty of bears, panthers and wolves.

They built their cabin opposite of where the church now stands and the clearing thus started was to be known as King's Settlement. Previous to 1806 a circut rider came to this hamilet holding meetings at the King home. In 1826 the Genango Circut was formed having a presiding elder and three circut riders whose salary was paid by subscription. The Rev. Benjamin Shepman received \$99.32 for one year. The King's Settlement Church or Society was legally organized on March 30, 1835.

Soon afterwards, Geo. H. King built a church on his land and in May 1843 sold it to the trustees for the consideration of \$300.00 lawful money of the United States of America. The Sunday School Register of 1857 shows a membership of thirty four and in 1875 it had reached eighty four. As time went on only a few were left, faithful to the old church, and services were discontinued after 1921. On July 30, 1927 the church property was sold to the late Clarence King thus reverting to the descendant of the original owner."

Ref. From a newspaper clipping submitted in 1942 to the D.A.R. by Mrs. Ida King, Kings Settlement, N.Y. who was over 80 years old at that time.

Much of this King Family Genealogy was obtained and verified from the family Bible of Ida King and from the other sources shown. Some of the material has been accepted by the D.A.R. At least two men of this King Family were in the Revolutionary War.

continued

Mrs. Ida King, in writing on the History of King Settlement and the church states:

"King's Settlement and it's church seemed to center around one George H. King, and it may be interesting to know a little of his family history.

Samuel and his son Hezekiah, were active in their own town affairs, serving on committies for the apportionment of land for the early settlers in Mansfield and Bolton, Conn.

Captain John King organized the Methodist Church in New England in his home in 1789, and later led in building the first church in Mt. Washington, but prescribed it be for the free use for all denominations except the Shakers.

Previous to 1806, meetings were held in private houses and barns. In 1801 the noted Lorenzo Dow preached there.

John King served in the Revolutionary War as Captain of the 14th (Pacific Mountain Co.) First Birkshire Co. Regiment of Mass. Militia: Commissioned and entered service May 6th. 1776. Many of his descendants were outstanding military and naval officers, among the latter were Commodore Hazard Perry of Lake Erie battle fame.

George H. King, son of Captain John King enlisted in the service as a private at the age of 17, serving two years from Aug. 1779 to Aug. 1781 and received a pension. He and his brother John King, Jr. moved from Cambridge, N.Y. with their families in 1795 to the wilderness of Chenango Co. At this time the only inroads were those made by woodsman's axe, and the county was infested with bears, etc."

He built a log cabin opposite where the church now stands, and the clearing thus started was hereafter known as Kings Settlement. His and his brother's cabins a short distance north, were on the old Indian Trail which is now our County road. Only a few years ago, spearheads were found on these farms during ploughing. George King set aside a plot of land for burial purposes and his family and many of the families of the neighborhood buried their dead there, tombstones still standing bearing dates as early as 1808, 1810's and 1811.

She continues - "George H. King, soon after 1835, built a church on his land. (I have a bible from this Kings Settlement Church that was used by the minister, and lay on the pulpit stand until the church was disorganized.) Goldie Phillips.

In 1927 the church was sold by the trustees of the M. E. Church of Kings Settlement to the late Clarence A. King thus reverting to the descendants of the original owners. The 5th and 6th generations, direct descendants of the original settlers, now own the original grant."

"George and John King, brothers, from Duchess County, were among the first settlers of the town (North Norwich). They located in the east part of the town, at what is now known as King's Settlement. George died there some thrity years ago."

"Georges children were, George; Hezakiah; Benjamin H; Tama Married Charles Randall; Lottie married Elijah Buell; Lavina married David Webb."

JOHN KING is a difficult man to identify either in American or British records. It appears that there were two JOHN KINGS' in Mass., Bay at the same time. In Transactions and Collections of the American Antiquarian Society Vol. VII-1885 there is reference to two JOHN KINGS', p-392 shows JOHN KING of Weymouth, Seaman 1641, Master of THOMAS APPLEGATE'S boat of Weymouth. Page 307-08 JOHN KING and MARY, his wife "heretofore servants of the world JOHN HUMFREY. Esq.", make their account as followeth "they say that being bound to serce foure years only it was agreed that they should be freed when they came to New England." Signed JOHN KING--MARY KING., Boston 2nd Sept. 1640. A footnote reads: This was a year before HUMFREY left.

Which of the two JOHN KINGS' was the father of SAMUEL KING may be a question, however one of them was, as stated in Weymouth Vital Records 3:349-51 and that SAMUEL KING did marry EXPERIANCE PHILLIPS and that their children was Deacon HEZEKIAH KING, and others, and that he married SARAH REED.

WARREN, RICHARD, continued. father of Sarah Warren who married John Cook., sister of Mary Cook who married Lt. John Thompson whose daughter Esther Thompson married William Reed Jr., whose daughter Sarah Reed married Deacon Hezekiah King.

"Richard Warren was one of the first Pilgrams to be an Indian fighter, to be shot at with arrows and to be shooting at them with powder and ball. This incident occurred on Wed. the 6th of Dec., some four weeks after the Pilgrims landed. Ten men volunteered to go out on a Third Discovery to locate a suitable site for their colony. One of these men was Richard Warren, All under the command of Miles Standish.

At this time of year the wintery weather was getting sharper every day, with snow already flying, but the question of where to settle was undecided. Sailing was difficule but they eventually got nearer the shore where the water was smother. But it was very cold, the water froze on their clothes and made them many times, like coats of ice.

As they came in sight of Billings Gate Point in the township of Wellfleet they saw ten to twelve Indians cutting up fish. Nothing further was seen of the Indians during that day or the following, but on the third day in the early morning while they were breaking camp from behind their barricade, in preparation to return to their sloop, they heard a sudden and horribable great cry. One of their number shouted "they are men! Indians, Indians" then their arrows came flying among them. They charged for and assult but when half a musket shot away the Pilgrims opened fire and away went all the Indians who were followed a quarter mile, shot another volley and returned to their barricade where they found eighteen arrows, some of which had peirced coats left hung up in the barricade. This place was then called the First Encounter. This occured at Nauset, so named for the local Indians, a formatable tribe. Part of the township of Eastham is still known as Nauset"

But he had five daughters more come over with his wife in the "Anne", who are all married and living and have many children."

On the 7th day of October 1832, personally in open court before John Tracy, Levi Bigelow, Nathan Taylor, Charles York and Hezekiah Reed, Esquires, Judges of the Court of common pleas in and for said County of Chenango, being a Court of record in and for such County now sitting, JOHN KING, a resident of Norwich, in the County of Chenango in said state, aged 79 years, who first being sworn according to law, doth on his oath make the following declaration in order to obtain the benefit of the Act of Congress passed January 7, 1832.

That he entered the services of the United States under the following officers and served as herein stated: in the month of July 1776 (but can not recollect to the day of the month) he enlisted for three months in the town of Mt. Washington, state of Massachusetts, being his place of residence, into a company commanded by Capt. John Spurr, of Suffield, Mass., Lt. Elisha Hickock, Ensign Barrett, and was ordered to march to Albany in the state of New York, and from there (thence) to Saratoga Barracks, and remained there until the last of October, and was then discharged - had no written discharge, while at Saratoga Barracks, he was in the regiment commanded by Col. Solomon King, and does not recollect the names of any officers stationed there.

That about the last of December 1776, he enlisted at Mt. Washington, (being the place of his residence) for a term of six months, in a company commanded by Capt. Fosburg of Sheffield in the state of Massachusetts, to go to Quebec; that he started on the 6th day of January 1777 and march to Albany, N.Y. thence to Skeenes (?) Borough, and thence to Ticonderoga Ft. and thence to St. Johns, then to Montreal, stayed there about ten days and thence marched to Quebec: that he returned from Quebec about the last of May, 1777, and was discharged at Sheffield Mass., about 1st. June. During the above term of service he was under command of Capt. Fosburg, Lieut. Loomis, Ensign Barrit --- cannot recollect any other officers.

On the last of June he volunteered at Mt. Washington, Mass., in a company Commanded by Cept. Fosburg of Sheffield, Mass., for three months, Lieut. Loomis, Ensign Barret, in a regiment commanded by Capt. Hickock, Gen. Fellows, Brigadier Germain--Marched to Skeens Borough and joined the army under Gen. Schuyler, remained there a few days, and were order to retreat to a place called Schuyler's village in Saratoga County, remained there about a week, were pursued by Burgoyne's Army and retreated to Bemes Heights, was engaged in making entrenchments and breast works about three weeks. On our retreat from Schuyler's Village to Bemis Heights, Gen. Gates arrived and took command, as he understood that when the day of battle with Burgoyne commenced, he with the regiment to which he belonged, was ordered to Batten Kill. After marching a short distance, came upon a large number of Scows in the river loaded with provisions and camp tools belonging to Burgoyne's Army, which were taken and carried to Batten Kill; they were then ordered to cross the river from Batten Kill over to the Barracks at Saratoga, and was

present at the surrender of Burgoyne, does not recollect the names of any other officers. He was then ordered to Sheffield, Mass. with the army, where he was discharged. He has no written discharge.

At the time of the above enlistment, he resided at Mt. Washington, Mass.

That he has no documentary evidence, except the affidavits of GEORGE H. KING and DANIEL SAGE hereto annexed, of his service; and that he knows of no person whose testimony he can procure, who can testify to his service other than above named, and that his said services were all performed in the Revolutionary War.

In answer to the interrogations by the War Department, he deposed:

That he was born in Saybrook, Conn. 4 Sept. 1755.

That he has a record of his age in his family Bible.

That after he was discharged he went to Mt. Washington, Mass. where he remainded seventeen or eighteen years, when removed to Norwich, County of Chanango, New York, where he has resided ever since.

ITEM FIRST: - I give and devise unto my daughter ANNA SHAW my oldest cow all my hogs and geese -- one loom and apperatus thereto belonging -- my clock and all my books, and two spinning wheels, all my household furniture except my two beds and bedding and all the provisions that I may have on hand at my decease and also one pair of silver specticles.

ITEM SECOND: - I give and devise unto my son JOHN KING, Jun. five sheep to be the average with the flock.

ITEM THIRD: - I give and devise unto my daughter REUBA HAMMOND on bed and one half of my bedding and also a demand which I hold against her husband JAMES HAMMOND of thirty eight dollars on book account.

ITEM : - I give and devise unto my son JEREMIAH H. KING one span of horses, wagon and two horse wagon, sleigh and two horse harness, one fanning mill, cutting box and hay knife, my potash kettle and all my farming tools of every description, my saddle and bridle and all my barrels and tubs and all of my oats and all my sheep excepting five that I have here above devised to JOHN KING, Jun. and five that I hereafter devise to KING LYON, and all of the money that I may be possessed of at time of my decease and he shall pay all of my debts and shall pay to my son GEORGE KING a legacy which is herein provided of five dollars as also a legacy of five dollars to the heirs of my daughter CHARLLOTTE GUILE.

ITEM :- I give and devise to my daughter CAROLINE LYON my youngest cow and my best bed and one-half of my bedding.

ITEM; - I give and devise unto my grandson KING LYON five sheep.

ITEM:- I give and devise unto my son GEORGE KING five dollars.

ITEM: - I give and devise unto the heirs of my deceased daughter CHARLLOTTE GUILE five dollars.

ITEM:- And lastly as to all of the residue and remainder of my personal property estate goods and chattels of what kind and nature soever I give and devise the same to my daughter ANNA SHAW and I hereby appoint my son, JEREMIAH H. KING and my daughter ANNA SHAW executor and executrix of this my last Will and Testament hereby revoking all former Will made by me.

I, HEZEKIAH KING, of Dutchess County, in the province of New York, Will that my wife, Sarah, with my son, Samuel, with the help and assistance of Captain Jonathan Dunham of Sharon, shall be executors.

I give to my wife, Sarah, all my household goods, a yoke of oxen and three cows forever; also, the improvement of my land in Bolton.

To my eldest son, Hezekiah, I have already given by deed of gift.

I give to my son, Samuel, the half of a six schore acre lott in Sharon, which is my home lot, to take his choice in it, the other half my executors to sell for the payment of L 4- to my eldest daughter, Sarah, to Esther L 13, to Mary L 20 and to Bathsheba L 20, these sums to be the remaining portions of my estate to each of my said daughters, added to what they have already received. The remainder of the money said land shall be sold for to be for the payment of my debts.

I give to my two youngest sons, William and John, my land in Bolton, after their mother's decease, they to pay to their youngest sisters, Marcy and Alice, L 20 apiece. All notes due to me I order my executors to make use of for the payment of my debts, and as to the place I now live upon, I give my wife the improvement of it solong as she is pleased to live upon it, and my interest shall hold good. If she move, then my interest to Samuel.

My right of land in Sharon not already laid out, I order my executors to dispose of it for the payment of my obligations to the country. I give all the overplus to my wife and my son, Samuel, only I oblige them to reward Capt. Dunham for his services and help.

OBITUARY.

KING, FRANCIS WILLARD. b. Jan 2, 1846. d. May 31, 1903.

"Frank W. King passed peacefully into rest at his home, 23 Fair St. In this village early Sunday morning May 31, 1903 aged 57 years. Frank W. King was born in Kings Settlement, N.Y., Jan 2, 1846 and was the oldest son of the late John and Adelia King.

About the age of 15 years he moved with his parents, brothers and sisters into the village to reside, (Norwich N.Y.). Shortly after, he secured employment in the David Madole Hammer Shop where he advanced to foreman in the Polishing department. As he felt the carpenter trade was best suited to his tastes he entered the employ of Shuway and Wait, the then proprietors of a large planing mill. During his later years, he was one of the largest of the local contractors and builders, having worked on many imposing businesses and residental structures in this village. Among contracts already in hand which Mr. King was devoting his energies and time were those of Howard D. Newton, Esquire. (home, kilns, etc. Newtons Hop Yard) the R.C.Chapman house and the Reed business block.

In 1870 Mr. King married Miss Mary Cole, youngest daughter of the late Samuel Cole of this village. They had one daughter. Miss Lizzie C. King who survives together with his widow. There are also living three brothers John H., Judson D. King of Norwich and Adelbert E. King of Cleveland Ohio, and two sisters, Mrs. G. W. Sanders and Mrs. C. H. Loomis of Norwich. ---"

COOK-E, FRANCIS, b. 1577, Blythe, Nots, England, a wool-comber. Probably one of the original congregation to Scrooby for he came from a hamlet nearby. In 1606 he went to Amsterdam Holland where he remained until 1609 when he went to Lyden, Holland remaining there until 1620. During this time he met and married HESTER Mahieu in Lyden in 1613. There were five children from this marriage.

He was a Lyden Saint and 17th signer of the Mayflower Covenant and came over on it with his son John: His wife and other children came over later on the "ANNE", on the first voyage of the Mayflower of Harwich (180 tons), Christopher Jones, Master; out of London, mid-July 1620, droping anchor off Cape Cod Nov. 11, (old calander) with 102 passengers. His son John was a lad of eight and his father, in his mid-forties, when they sailed; One of the first purchasers of Dartmouth in 1652 and of Middlebourough in 1662. He settled in Plymouth, Mass.

JOHN COOKE came over in the Mayflower when a boy of eight. He was born in Lyden in 1612. This was a year before his father Francis married HESTER MAHIEU, however, it must be remembered that as the exact months and days are not shown, therefore under the old calander as opposed to the present one, a years difference might easily be shown. March 28, 1634 in Plymouth Mass. he married SARRAH WARREN, who came in the "ANNE" a 140 ton sailing ship out of London and arrived July-Aug. 1623. (see "ANNE" Stranger passenger list).

Under the passenger lists of "ANNE" Wm. Pierce, master, carrying five men, nine women and eighteen children as "Saints" is Mrs. HESTER MAHIEU COOKE, 1592-1675, M. FRANCIS, 1592-1675, m. FRANCIS COOK, Lyden Holland, 1613. She was a converted Walloon. The Walloons inhabited the Belgic border of France and spoke French. Owing to persecution many of them who were Protestants moved into Holland, (Esther) HESTER, wife of FRANCIS COOKE was one of them.

JOHN COOKE became a land owner in Plymouth and a deacon in the church until 1634 at which time religious difficulties developed between the denominations and with affairs of state. John was appointed to spy on the Baptists at Barnstable and as a result he accepted the Baptist religion therefore deprived of his office as Deacon and was excommunicated. In 1675 he removed to Dartmouth and became an occasional Baptist preacher. Between 1638-56 he was ten times a Deputy from Plymouth to the General Court.
